Camellia sasanqua

These are the fall blooming camellias. They are native to southern Japan. Native plants are small trees up to 16 feet tall. Flowers are generally white with few petals and lightly fragrant. The leaves are generally smaller than *japonicas* and flowers shatter readily, making them unsuitable for cut flowers. They bloom from September through December, and are excellent landscape plants. They will grow in either sun or shade and may not be quite as cold hardy as the *japonicas*.

Camellia japonica

By far the most important ornamental camellia, believed to be native to Japan - hence the name. These variable plants range from small shrub to small tree and up to 30 or more feet tall. In the wild, it grows as an understory plant on hillsides. Flowers vary in size and color, but generally are single with five to six petals, and are red. However white and pink are known. They are winter blooming, have beautiful shiny evergreen leaves, and an interesting brown trunk. Today, they have been hybridized more than any other camellia, and flowers are available in all sizes, colors, and forms.

Camellia reticulata

This species was represented by one plant in England in the 1800's. However, this did not hybridize with other camellias, and no other *reticulatas* were known in the western world, until the 1940's, when they were brought out of the southern part of China. They have the largest of all camellia flowers and have resulted in exquisite crosses with *japonicas*.

Camellia hybrids

Any plant that result from the crossing of more than one species of camellia. Many are available, and they add much to the camellia world in the way of color, fragrance, and hardiness. We had 15 members helping at our UWF clean up on Saturday, September 29th for weeding, gibbing, trimming and picking up branches. Work was completed quickly thanks to Alan who brought the donuts to get us all moving!

Whoops!!!

Next year on Wednesday, January 30, we'll be repeating our picnic trip to Jim Smelley's for picnicking, flower looking, and grafting. If you'll recall we all had a great time this year although the grafting was the worst failure of which I'm aware. We originally had a success rate of 84% but then, we think, and I repeat think, that last year's failure was due to a combination of things: the soil in Mississippi is heavier than our Pensacola soil and that coupled with a much higher rainfall than usual allowed the



fungus phytophthora cinnamomi (root rot) to take hold, infect, and destroy our grafts. We rarely have root rot in ground planted camellias here in Pensacola because our soil is so well drained. If you grow or graft in pots, you may want to consider a product called Subdue to prevent any root rot problems.

SO, you may ask, what is going to prevent the same occurrence from destroying my graft(s) again? GOOD QUESTION!

Next year, prior to our trip, your ever-learning author will visit Jim Smelley's with our own renowned nurseryman, John Davy, to treat the root stock with a product to prevent root rot from occurring.

Between now and our trip, use the time to look, listen, read, and ask.

LOOK at pictures, the blooms that come to our meetings, and especially those exhibited at our show.

LISTEN to what various growers have to say about specific varieties.

READ about the varieties you're considering—growth habit, growth rate bloom time; etc.

ASK who has the variety you're interested in and may you have a scion(s). Jim Smelley has a comprehensive selection, but he may not have what you're looking for and a club member may.

Most important, our club has some knowledgeable members; engage them in conversation, they'll be more than happy to help you select the proper camellia for whatever your goal may be.

We'll disseminate more info on time, place; etc., as the date draws near.

2018- 2019 Gibbing Schedule for Camellia Shows near Pensacola

This schedule is an approximation based upon an average time between the application of the gibberellic acid and blooming of about 6 weeks, bracketed with applications a week earlier or later. Thus, there are three application dates for each show. For example, if you gib 2 blooms on each plant at each application, you would have gibbed a total of 6 blooms on that plant --- and with luck maybe 1 of them will open in time for that show. The estimated time is for an average japonica plant in moderate shade and under normal Pensacola weather conditions.

There is no fixed time for the gib to take effect, and many factors will affect the time. Early blooming varieties usually bloom more quickly and late blooming varieties usually take longer; some take much longer. More mature buds will bloom sooner than less mature ones. Reticulatas normally average a longer time to bloom than do japonicas. Plants in full sun may also bloom sooner. Of course, abnormally warm weather will accelerate blooming, while heavy freezes and colder conditions will delay blooming.
