President's Message

This past week, I was leafing through the 1953 edition of *The American Camellia Yearbook*, one of many American Camellia Society yearbooks donated to our Club from the estate of a past member, and became intrigued by what I could learn about camellias.

For instance, did you know that Greenville, Alabama, just two hours north of Pensacola on I-65, has the official designation as "Camellia City"? In addition, though there are several cities in the South to which the name has been applied, the Greenville citizens are convinced that theirs is the only city that should be known by that name.

According to the article "Greenville - The Camellia City" by J. Glen Stanley, it all began in 1937 when the Garden Editor of *Holland: The Magazine of the South*, on a visit to the city, made a remark that he had never seen so many large camellia plants in any one city. This comment was overhead by the editor of the local newspaper who afterwards took every opportunity to use the moniker when referring to Greenville, even adding it besides the newspaper's name on the front page along with a sketch of a camellia.

The nickname "Camellia City" quickly caught on and was adopted by Greenville city officials, civic organizations, and local businesses. At that time, Greenville was the home of the three well-known


camellias Alba Plena, Pride of Greenville and Beauty of Greenville and its citizens were proud of their beautiful camellias.

What also amazed me from Mr. Stanley's article is that Greenville's 1950 Camellia Show was attended by 5000 visitors from all but eight of the 67 counties in the state, even though four other Camellia Shows were held in Alabama on the same date. Additionally, their 1952 Show had "only" 3500 visitors (due to an unfavorable Camellia season); however, those visitors represented 97 cities, 21 states, and two foreign countries!



Fun fact: Did you know that over the years the camellia plant became so admired in the South, that in 1959, the state representative from Butler County (Greenville) proposed the camellia as the State Flower of Alabama (replacing goldenrod) and it was made so?

If you are interested, Greenville will host its Annual Camellia City Festival on Saturday, March 28. Would it not be fun to drive around the town to see how many camellias are still in

resident's gardens?

Quick quiz: Can you name two other Gulf Coast towns that also enjoy that designation "Camellia City"?

Although such largely attended Camellia Shows, as mentioned above, are now in the past, one truth remains the same- the immense enjoyment that the camellia brings to its devoted growers and hobbyists. A heartfelt thank you for all members who assisted in making our Pensacola Camellia Club's December show a successful one.

Blooms were judged once and the better ones moved to the contention table for a second judgment to determine which blooms were the best of show. Six months ago I wouldn't have known Japonica from a harmonica, Reticulata was not a part of my vocabulary, and if someone said they had gibberellic acid, I would have recommended Rolaids. Needless to say, my Camellia knowledge was at a very low pedestrian level. With this as my flower background, I attended my first Camellia show and worked as a clerk and runner. As I topped the stairs at the UWF conference center, I saw Judge and Mrs. Vinson preparing their Camellia blooms for the show. Mrs. Vinson kindly directed me to the lounge where coffee and a large variety of pastry treats awaited me. I now felt that I was prepared for the big show! As I entered the show room, I was greeted by the melodious voice of Col. Dick Hooton as he barked instructions to all the workers. I soon discovered that a Camellia show is similar to other shows in that tables and chairs have to be moved, and moved, and moved until there is a consensus as to their proper location. After the tables were properly placed, the blooms began to arrive for show. Very quickly the room was filled with beautiful Camellias, many the likes of which I had never seen. I had not seen so many flower blooms since the flower market scene in My Fair Lady. When all blooms had been properly placed, the judges were brought into the room, teamed up into teams of three and the clerks and runners into pairs. The judging started and moved very quickly and I stayed very busy transporting blue ribbon blooms to the judges table. After receiving instructions as to the proper manner of presentation of the tray of blooms to the judges, everything went very smoothly. I was impressed as to how the show proceeded as a lot happened in a short period of time before the public arrived to view the winning blooms. I certainly did not envy the judges because they had a difficult job picking winners



from that many beautiful Camellia blooms; their experience was evident. I look forward to my next Camellia show, and I don't know if I will present blooms for judging, but I will be there. My final observation from my first Camellia show is that it is much easier to judge people than it is to judge Camellia blooms for blue ribbons.

In summary, I was very impressed with the club members who put on such a well organized and efficient show of amazing beauty.




Upcoming Events

A few iPhone photos pointers...

- 1. Clean the lens on the back of you iPhone before taking photos.
- 2. Be ready for photo with shortcut. Swipe up from the lock screen to access the camera or simply swipe to the left without worrying about a pass code.
- 3. Tap to Focus and Hold to Lock Focus. When you tap the photo to begin the process instead of releasing it simply hold it for a couple seconds and the text will appear at the top "AE/AF LOCK". When you are done, simply tap the screen again to unlock. When in doubt go slightly darker you can lighten it in editing apps.
- 4. Use the on-screen Grid. This applies The Rule of Thirds. It can help you frame the perfect shot. Go to Settings > Photos & Camera and toggle the Grid switch on.
- 5. Adjust the Brightness with the Exposure Slider. Simply Tap the screen to focus and bring up the Exposure Slider and then slide up and down to adjust as needed.
- 6. Zoom with your Feet. Your iPhone doesn't have an optical zoom, so when you use the digital zoom function you create a lower resolution image that blurs your images. Instead, try and get closer to your subject to get a full resolution photo with crisp details. You are better off cropping your photo using an editing app.
- 7. Snap the shot with your Volume button. This tip seems simple but the tactile feedback of the volume + button on your iPhone can help you keep the phone steady as you shoot for clearer pictures
- 8. Turn on the auto HDR feature. This stands for High Dynamic Range, and it helps bring out details in photos that would be missed when shooting in auto mode.
