Members Corner

Fairchild's Mule by Roger Vinson

Most of us who grow camellias know that the traditional camellias grown in our area are the Japonicas and Sasanquas. We also know that over the past fifty years or so, new camellias have been introduced in ever-increasing numbers - - - the hybrids. These are generally identified as either Non-Reticulata Hybrids or Reticulata Hybrids. They have greatly expanded the types of available options we have. For example, we have fragrant camellias, yellow camellias, white (or almost white) Reticulatas, and now the most recent introductions: Azalea Camellia hybrids that are ever-blooming, or at least bloom well outside the regular camellia blooming season. We recognize that hybrids are an important part of not only camellias, but also the entire plant world: roses, corn, wheat, rice, and innumerable others. However, that has not always been the case.

Hybridization really begins with Thomas Fairchild, the leading nurseryman in England in the early 1700s. He lived in Hoxton, just outside the city of London, and was known for bringing brightly flowering plants to England from America and the Netherlands. At that time, English gardens were mostly lawns and topiary, mostly colorless, especially in the fall and winter. He lived at a time when God fearing men (and women) believed that mankind and nature were closely correlated, and what God had created was not to be tinkered with. And Thomas

Fairchild was a very religious man. So it was with great apprehension that he set two flowerpots in his greenhouse, one of Carnations and one of Sweet William, and using a feather carefully took pollen from the Sweet William onto the stigma of the Carnation. Then he waited for seed, and then planted the seed. Lo and behold, the blooms that resulted combined into pink flowers with the carnation's double blossoms and the Sweet William's clustering. It was the world's first manmade plant hybrid, and soon became known as the "Fairchild Mule." Fairchild's hybrid rapidly became known among England's nurserymen, but also in the enlightened scientific community of England. The most important institution in the country, the Royal Society, invited him to make a presentation at one of its weekly Thursday meetings. That meeting of the leading scientists of the nation, on February 4, 1720, was led by the Society's President, Isaac Newton. Those in attendance recognized the significance of what he had done. But Fairchild, fearful of incurring God's wrath for what he had done, called the hybrid "an accident" which he had found when the plants had been closely spaced and their flowerheads touched, thereby pollinating each other.

Regardless of what he disclaimed, he was acclaimed for changing the horticultural world. A new era was born, with English gardens boasting of a wide variety of new plants. Over 200 new nurseries sprang up in the country. English gardens were being copied all around the world.

To make amends, when Fairchild died in 1729, he bequeathed the sum of 25 pounds sterling to his parish church, "Shoreditch", for the preaching "annually forever" of a sermon on "the wonderful works of God in the Creation," or "the Certainty of the Creation." And so it has been done, even for almost three hundred years. When his church was no longer able to do it, it transferred the annual sermon/lecture to St. Gildes, Cripplegate, the ancient church where John Milton worshipped in London. It is under the auspices of the Worshipful Company of Gardeners, a charitable and ceremonial guild established by Royal Charter in 1605 to promote the art and practice of good gardening in London, support charitable horticultural activities, and promote the fellowship of gardening. Each year, on the first Tuesday of Pentecost, the Gardeners don their fur-trimmed gowns and ceremonial chains and carry their symbolic silver spades to the altar to hear the "Fairchild Sermon." Thomas Fairchild would be proud.

So, when you see the camellia hybrids at a camellia show or plant one in your garden, think about the "Fairchild Mule" and how far we've come.

We appreciate all of our members and ask that you kindly wear your mask out of respect for each other; anyone of us could unknowingly be a carrier of this virus.

Second, Gib & Bring your Blooms

Gib your blooms now so you can enter them into the show. We want a good show with lots of local blooms from our members. For new members, there is a Novice category where your blooms can compete for prizes. Seasoned members will be around to assist you if you need the help with bloom prep during the show.

Third, Help at the Show

Below is a list of where your help is needed on the day of the show. Please read through our needs, and plan to sign up at the November meeting or by replying to the newsletter.

Camellia Bloom Prep, Show & Awards - Skip Vogelsang <u>Ibv3rd@gmail.com</u> is the Show Chairman in charge and taking all questions prior to the show. At our December 8th meeting Skip will demonstrate the job of **Bloom Placement** based on division for unprotected and protected with sub categories for the various classes that he will explain in detail at the meeting. The day of the show, exhibitors will arrive at 7:00am to prepare their blooms in the prep area, café room at the Garden Center. When the exhibitors have their blooms & entry card ready you will carry trays of blooms to the large room where Dick Hooton, aka' the gate keeper' will review every entry card for correct information. Dick will tell you to proceed in placing the bloom at the correct division, class table or if there is an error to return the bloom to the exhibitor. This work starts at 7:00am and must be completed by 10:00am.

Judges- Roger Vinson is the lead person for ACS certified judges and Allan McMillan is assisting with the novice judges. Roger will recruit most of the judges from out of town along with some novice judges but this year we will use local judges too due to the virus. They are grouped in teams of three and will need a clerk and runner for each team starting at 10:30am.

Clerks and runners- Bill Lyford will be the lead person for clerks and runners. He will need a clerk and a runner for each team of judges. Your job is to remain silent while the judges make the decisions. Clerks place color stickers on entry cards based on their award level or place 'head table' cards for blooms that move on in the competition. The runner will use a tray to carry the bloom with its entry card to the 'head table' where two members will review the entry information against the Camellia Nomenclature book. Note that 'head table' and 'contention table' mean the same thing and you will hear both words used throughout the judging. All of the head table blooms will be reexamined by the judges in order to move on to the next stage. Clerks and runners will be needed at this stage to add up scores for each bloom to determine our winners for the various prizes. Once the winners are finalized, they will need to be placed on the award table. Dick Hooton and Christi Hankins will be directing you to place the winner of each category in its designated spot on the award table.

Membership –Debbie Brown will be the lead person for Membership to Pensacola Camellia Club and American Camellia Society during the public viewing hours 1-4pm. She would like 1 person to assist her with membership.

Plant sales - Trumin Brown will be the lead person for plant sales. All plants will be labeled with bloom photos, descriptions and price to make work easy. Sales will be outdoors, from 9-4pm and he would like 2 shifts of 3-4 helpers.

Clean Up – The show ends at 4:00pm, then you may take blooms to enjoy and share with friends, otherwise they will all go in the trash. Every bloom cup will be emptied, stacked and boxed, toys for tots loaded for the marines, and plants that did not sell back in the van. Cleaning and packing up at the end of the day is easy with many hands.

If you read through all of this you know we will need many hands and smiling faces for a day filled with camellias. PLEASE Help throughout the day where you can and have your family and friends come to the show and see all of the beautiful blooms. We ask that everyone wear a mask inside during the day.
