John Mate and Bill Lyford will be completing the irrigation system to these raised beds soon. This will allow the club to a graft some desirable reticulates that cannot be air layered. 'Frank Houser Variegated' is one that



everyone would like to purchase, but must be grafted. Our potted plants have been weeded and are looking great for future sales next fall. The other propagation method is air layering.



Please attend one or more of Greg Taylor's scheduled air layering work days in April. If you do not know how to air layer, still come, we will teach you the skill or you can assist with the steps to this process. Extra hands make the work go quickly. This work is a continuing cycle of production of another year of home-grown camellias that will be sold a year later. This is the least expensive way for increasing our inventory and to fulfill the many requests from members and


the general public who are looking for that special camellia.

Gulf Port Show and won Best Miniature with 'Perl's Pet' and Best Species with C. edithae.





Jim and I had a number of "firsts" this camellia season. Our first, Atlantic Coast and Gulf Coast conferences, our first Middle Georgia, New Orleans, Baton Rouge, Brookhaven camellia shows, and our first trip to California camellia gardens and a California Camellia show.

For the New Orleans show we collected and prepared several flowers the night before the show and did a final scan of the garden very early the morning of the show. We entered 2 Trays of 3 of the single variety (Royal Velvet); 1 Nicky Crisp; 1 Black Magic; and 1 Nuccio's Cameo. Royal Velvet treated us well: We won Best Tray of 3! So unexpected and so cool!



For Baton Rouge we entered 1 tray of 3 (Royal Velvet), 2 single Royal Velvet, 1 April Rose, 1 Tudor Baby and 2 single Black Magic. We collected most blooms the night before the show because we had to leave so early the day of the show. The two Black Magic's were not fully

opened so we decided to leave them until the next morning. Picture this: 4:00 am, pitch black, rain, 42 degrees looking for the Black Magic plant. Find it and they still aren't open. We have nothing to lose, we collect and prepare it. By the time we got to Baton Rouge, both flowers were perfectly open and perfectly perfect! We also won our first Best in Show. Completely unexpected and completely cool!





Jim judged at all the shows, and Kristin clerked. Camellia people are so nice. We met so many lovely people at every show and look forward to seeing our new friends again. The lessons we learned from competing: always do a final check of the garden the morning of the show (even at 4:00 am in the rain); when in doubt, take the flower; it is ok to be competitive, but it is more important to have fun!

The late February trip to California was full of more firsts. We started at The Huntington Botanical Gardens in Pasadena. It has formal gardens of dozens of species. Huge reticulatas are everywhere and there was zero petal blight. Most of the camellias have a large identification tag which makes viewing the plants and flowers so much more interesting and memorable.

The next day we were excited to start our day at world famous



Nuccio's Nursery! Guess what...closed on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Oh well. We drove around the nearby mountains and then headed to Descanso Gardens. Due to rain, sleet, and snow, we had Descanso to ourselves. While both The Huntington and Descanso are amazing gardens, we preferred the less formal and more "rustic" look of Descanso. One of the things we appreciated most about Descanso was the large groupings of camellias. 8, 9, 10 of the same variety grouped together, making it easy to understand the growth habit of a particular to a variety.

The blooms at both gardens were so prolific it is hard to imagine that we were not there at the peak of the blooming season. But as many blooms as there were in bloom, there were that many more not yet open buds on the cusp of bursting forth!


