If you recall at our last meeting back in April, Mack Thetford explained that all you need is a teaspoon of fertilizer twice a year. I have been checking regularly to see if my plants have started budding. I hope you see buds!

The goal for each and every one of us is to have a winning bloom in the December 14th show. On some plants I have already started "disbudding" and gibbing. The benefit of disbudding is to reduce the stress on the plant resources, while gibbing creates a larger bloom. My goal is to have blooms to attend the show in Perry, Georgia on October 12<sup>th</sup>. Attend our September 17<sup>th</sup> meeting, will have gib available for members.

We are hosting the Gulf Coast Camellia Society's conference this October 18th-19<sup>th</sup> at the Holiday Inn Resort located at 14 Via De Luna Drive. Last year's conference was in Covington, Louisiana. Last year I purchased 'Ferris Wheel' at the auction. A bloom from this plant won "Best in Show" at Gulfport, Mississippi; this was my first "Best in Show."

Our speakers this year are; Jane Benson covering "The History of Pensacola Camellias at UWF Camellia Garden" and Randolph Maphis on "John Wang's Contribution to the Camellia World." ## Sharing .... The Mission of Pensacola Camellia Club By John Davy

The purpose of the Pensacola Camellia Club is to encourage others to learn the culture of camellias.

As I sit here cleaning harvested seed form a seedling of 'Showa Nishiki's# 06-10 (not named and may never be named) I reflect back to the source of the seedlings parent plant and how it relates to the purpose of the club.

Vi Stone of Baton Rouge smuggled the cutting of 'Showa Nishiki' from the Emperial Gardens of

Japan in the early 1970's. (there's a story here) Vernon Howell of Mississippi propageted the cuttings and later shared the cuttings with me.





Seed harvest season will include camellia sasanqua # 07-14. A red Yuletide seedling, here is yesterday's seed pod harvest. The seed pods will split open in the next 24 hours, the seed will be extracted, bagged in zip lock bags with enough water to wet the seeds, labeled and refrigerated until sowing in community flats next week. We are growing #07-14 as a Yuletide replacement. It has greater vigor than the seed parent and greater resistance to camellia dieback. The bloom season on 07-14 is late October-December Photo taken last year on plants in product at PGI.

Here is another example of seed pod harvest. Photos from last fall of 'L.A. Lady' original seedling planted at the main office at Panhandle Growers, Inc. The majority will be grown as rootstock for grafting.








Continuing with Kick Off of the Season... here are some football themed camellias. See if you can match the name of the camellia to the following statements:
