Pensacola Camellia Club Established in 1937

In 2018 Melinda and I were just starting our journey (some might say obsession) with camellias. That Christmas we were heading to Orlando to celebrate Christmas with her family. In a normal year we would have blissfully driven past Gainesville. Our new membership in the American Camellia Society provided us free entrance to botanical gardens. We spent most of the afternoon wandering around Kanapaha and Wilmot Gardens. Pictured below is from 2018, the poinsettia tree fascinated me.

This year's American Camellia Society's Convention was hosted by the Gainesville Camellia Society on January 2nd-5th. Part of their convention included a tour of Wilmot Gardens and their show was at Kanapaha. Our guide below at Wilmot Gardens was Dr. C. Craig Tisher; he was also our guide back in 2018.







More than 400 camellias, with 270 different cultivars, are located at Wilmot Gardens. Many of the specimens comprise two specialty gardens within Wilmot Botanical Gardens, the Gordy Camellia Garden and the newly created Mendenhall Family Camellia Walk. Since 2018, 100 camellias have been transplanted from the private garden of Clarence and Lillian Gordy from Ocala.



Melinda and I did spend most of the day Friday and Saturday with show set up and hospitality at Kanapaha. We also learned how to pronounce it properly. Emphasis is on the 2nd "a".

The garden is private and does not reciprocate with the American Camellia Society. The admission is \$12; it was \$8 in 2018.

Speaking of representing our club...at the Gainesville Camellia Show Kristin and Jim DeReuil took home a few prizes in the following categories; Unprotected Japonica, very large runner

Ringing in the New Year with Camellias by Kristin & Jim DeReuil



Jim and I rang in the New Year by taking a short road trip to Eden Gardens State Park in Santa Rosa Beach. If you have never been, it is worth the relatively short drive.

Eden Gardens is a 163-acre state park that was part of the historic Wesley Homestead, the home of one of the first families to settle the Point

Washington Area. Lois Maxon purchased the home in 1963 along with 10.5 acres and proceeded to devote a million dollars to an extensive renovation of the home. She donated the property to the Florida Park Service on Christmas Eve 1968 (Thank you, Lois Maxon!).



There is a list of camellias on the Friends of Eden Gardens website. The Friends of Eden Gardens are working to expand the catalog and properly identify all the camellia plants whose labels have fallen off or become illegible. The list is very comprehensive and includes pictures. Very impressive!

The camellias are generally located in two separate areas, both easily accessible from the parking lot. If it is a nice day and you are looking for something to do, it is worth the drive. In addition to the camellias, you can tour the Wesley House, fish and hike. There are relatively easy trails that weave through the park.

They did a nice job camouflaging their electric meters. We will see something similar at the UWF Gardens in the near future.

John Davy is scheduled to speak at the Eden Gardens State Park Camellia Festival (10 am -2 pm February 8, 2025) and the Pensacola Camellia Club will have an information table. If you





go to Eden Gardens, look carefully for the camellias from the Pensacola Camellia Club that the Gardens' purchased to add to their collection.

The Annual Camellia Festival at Eden Gardens State Park will be held on Saturday February 8th, from 10am-2pm. This event, hosted by The Friends of Eden, is free with paid park admission which is \$4 per vehicle. Additional parking for the event will be available at Bay Elementary School with tram service to the park. The back gate will also be open during the event which is a short walk from the Bay Elementary parking lot.

There will be educational stations set up throughout the park for guests to enjoy, and live music played by Earth Vibes Band on the Bayou Stage. Bring your appetite too, because B's Smoking Barbecue will be selling delicious food & drinks near the pavilion.

Inside the Pavilion we will have a Camellia Waxing Demonstration, information about grafting from Pensacola Camellia Club, and information about air-layering from Walton County Master Gardeners. The camellia fundraiser will be held at the Friends of Eden Nursery area, and several educational booths will be located throughout the park including: Tri-County Beekeepers, Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance, Alaqua Animal Rescue, Friends of South Walton Sea Turtles, Choctawhatee Audubon Society and more.
